NOTES FROM OUR DIRECTOR

Dear Friends,

It's such a pleasure to look back on the activities and accomplishments of 2024! It was our first full year in our new Harris Avenue home, our membership grew by over 15% and we earned support for our programs and initiatives from local, state and national funders from government, corporations and private foundations. With this support, we were able to provide our signature mix of writing groups, rigorous craft-based workshops and professional development practicums, growing participation in all offerings, serving over 1,350 attendees and showcasing over 200 local artists.

We also grew our connections within the arts and cultural community, taking advantage of our new home in the burgeoning Valley Arts District, where we're surrounded by other creative organizations and individuals. Something as simple as a walk down the block to Whisk Me Away Bakehouse or New Harvest Coffee often resulted in a serendipitous conversation that led to a new project or partnership, and we were thrilled to participate in over 20 partnering events over the course of the year.

We continued to prioritize growing and supporting a diverse membership. Thanks to grant funding from multiple sources, we were able to host monthly B/I/POC Coffee Hours under the leadership of our B/I/POC Advisory Committee, host a day-long event by and for writers of color, offer two free seats in each paid workshop to B/I/POC community members, and once again support, in partnership with Haus of Codec, a memorable Queer Writers' Showcase during Pride celebrations. We also highlighted and celebrated diverse writing practices in our programming and connected writers across a wide breadth of genres.



A letter from LitArts RI's new Executive Director Christina Bevilacqua

The experience of preparing our 2024 Annual Report from the vantage point of mid-2025 has made me wonder whether, as if in a fairy tale, we somehow fell asleep in late December of 2024 and have just woken up a century later, into a world profoundly changed. Over the past six months, as resources for nonprofits and the arts have been slashed and funding priorities drastically altered, we continually remind ourselves of our priorities and reimagine and strategize new ways to sustain and grow the resources needed to support them.

Lance Richardson was a Cullman Center Fellow at the New York Public Library.


Kim Salinas Silva's poem "The Singing Girl" was nominated for a Science Fiction and Fantasy Rhysling Poetry Award.

Awards.


Doug Still's podcast *This Old Tree* was awarded the Gold Media Award from Garden Communications International.




FY2024 OPERATING INCOME

In 2024 the LitArts RI community said farewell to **Jillian Winters**, co-founder of the organization and its Operations Director for six years. Jillian was the person who set up the tech before your open mic or fixed it when it broke. She trained many of you in on the studio equipment. She took your photo when you came to sign your book for the local author library. She made the coffee. She balanced the budget. She wrote a whole lot of grants. She led our staff, paid our bills, manage the finances, planned parties and events. She did it all with an infectious joy that has infused this space with warmth and welcome.

Underlying the many responsibilities Jillian carried out was her love and appreciation for this particular place and the people who are drawn to it, as well as her ability to see those who were not in the room yet. She **created a culture of welcome** that you may have felt when you first stepped in the door. You might not have known then how much of her is in this place, but recognizing it now allows us to see what makes a community flourish around the arts as well as the values that bring us together.
